RIPPLE

Feeling safe and connected through positive relationships to achieve educational outcomes

Positive relationships promoting feelings of safety and connection are at the heart of all learning at Kairos Community College. With this foundation in mind, the Ripple Model was developed and is embedded throughout our whole school community.

The Ripple diagram demonstrates the three levels of our unique model, which is a fusion of youth work practice and neuro-education principles:



1. At the centre is Wellness of Mind.

What do we mean by this? In essence what this means is to have wellness of mind you need to feel safe, feel you have sense of control and be able to experience pleasure or meaning to have a positive learning experience. This is one of the biggest barriers to learning when these three basic neurological needs are not being met and unfortunately constantly overlooked in traditional school settings. If you don't feel safe your brain is amazingly responsive and will go into survival mode, fight, flight or freeze. At that point all you can do is either shut down or freeze, avoid or flight or going on the defensive, fight.

So a big part of our role as educators, step one is just getting young people to feel safe again. This takes time and we have to remind ourselves that taking that time is extremely valuable and through that process the learning is just as rich and useful as any other more traditional versions of learning.

2. The next level is to feel connected through positive secure relationships.

Whether this is with an educator, peers, through culture or community we know that the brain lights up when it is engaged with others and learns more effectively when there are securely attached relationships. We know now through advances in neuroscience that our brain creates new neural pathways and is open to new learning when it involves a social aspect. It needs other humans to start to learn!

The great thing is that ancient communities have been using this way of learning for a long time which we can base our practices on, we call this a tribal learning community. They believe every person in the tribe has a unique gift that contributes to the tribe, the idea of leadership is about supporting the tribe to bring out individuals strengths and support the tribe to be the best they can.

As a civilisation we lost our way when we hit the industrial revolution in terms of education. Being time and financially efficient became the most important commodity. Relationships could not compete with greed. Unfortunately our brains did not get the memo. This way of operating using production lines is fantastic for making cars and washing machines but unfortunately is not so good for helping young people to engage in learning in dynamic ways that honour their uniqueness as a human being.

RIPPLE MODEL

The industrial education system is failing so many intelligent, and dynamic young people because they get treated like a number on a production line never being seen or feeling like they actually matter in the world. Every day we strive to help our students feel like they matter and most importantly feel safe. One of the ways we help create safety is through our tribal principles of honesty, respect, participation, safety and legal.

3. In saying that you may be starting to think are we a school or a youth service? This is where our third level comes in - achieving academic outcomes.

We pride ourselves on making sure that our students have access to complete their Queensland Certificate of Education just like they would if they were attending a mainstream school. One of the common misconceptions is young people who do not want to be at mainstream school must not want to be doing the same subjects as their mainstream school peers. I am yet to meet that young person. Please have a look at our subject displays to get a snapshot into the high quality work that is being produced by our students.

The neuroscience field has provided us with amazing evidence that demonstrates that there are some really basic practices that will create neural-plasticity. Neural-plasticity in our brains is what you want if you need to learn something new or change an old habit. One of the ways to create this is by achieving whole brain integration; that is by engaging the left logical brain with the right emotional brain. As part of our model, one of our practices that the team of teachers and youth workers engage in is what we call collaborative lesson planning which aims to incorporate some of the following elements, emotional thinking, storytelling, role play, movement, novelty, and music into every lesson plan of every single subject. Not only that but we also embed all our social and emotional learning into our formal curriculum as opposed to stand alone programs. These are some of the many practices we use here to engage our students in learning.

Emma Burridge SENIOR YOUTH WORKER



Madi is passionate about helping to make a difference in the lives of young people and loves that she gets to learn so much from the young people as well.




Kinderen EDUCATOR

CURRICULUM - CALOUNDRA

Kairos Community College is a school that celebrates diversity and provides a supportive learning environment essential for fostering inclusivity, understanding, and academic success among students. The school values practices that ensure equal opportunities for all students, regardless of race, ethnicity, gender identity, sexual orientation, religion, or disability.

The school provides a multi-faceted curriculum that focuses on the holistic development of students, including academic, social, emotional, and physical growth. This means incorporating extra-curricular subjects and activities that nurture various aspects of a student's personality. Kairos Community College recognises that students have different learning needs and abilities, and provides a supportive curriculum incorporating differentiated instruction strategies. This involves offering varying levels of curriculum complexity, providing additional support or challenges as needed, and using a variety of teaching methods to reach all learners. Our curriculum involves active engagement with parents and the wider community. The collaboration between schools, families, and community organisations enriches the educational experience and provides additional support for students both inside and outside the classroom.

The primary focus for young people enrolling in Kairos is the opportunity to graduate Year 12 and achieve a Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE). In order to attain a QCE students need to accumulate 20 QCE points by the end of Year 12. Across Years 10 to 12 Kairos offers the opportunity for students to accumulate 35 QCE points.

With the dedicated support of all staff Kairos Community College offers a broad range of educational, social and high interest programs and activities for our young people including but not limited to:

Dungeons and Dragons, Functional Fitness, the Kokoda Challenge, Artistic Fencing, 3D Design and Printing, Sporting Masterclasses, DJ Skills, Cooking, Meditation and Mindfulness.

All these opportunities form part of our extracurricular program offering our young people the opportunity to engage, participate and make social connections within our community, and these are provided before and after school hours.

We seek to inspire our young people to become life-long learners by providing them with opportunities that allows them to engage productively with society.

As Kairos offers Authority Registered Subjects students are eligible to gain their QCE (Queensland Certificate of Education) upon the completion of Year 12. The QCE requires that 20 credit points be achieved across Years 11 and 12 through a variety of subjects. Each core subject is worth 4 credit points. All of our 2023 graduates exceeded expectations in achieving their QCE and we celebrate our continued focus of ensuring 100% QCE outcomes for all of our students.

All Kairos educators continue to develop their professional practice through a mixture of online and face-to-face professional development courses. This year saw teachers engage in several courses to prepare them for the implementation of the new 2024 QCAA Applied Syllabus and Version 9 of the Australian Curriculum. Kairos will begin a staged implementation of v.9 of the Australian Curriculum over 2024-2025.

As always, we look to improve on current practices and develop our teachers to become the best in this sector. But of course, no curriculum work could be achieved without the efforts and determination of our students, whose resilience and grit to show up every day and achieve amazing things gives us the passion to work harder and to become better at what we do.

YOUTH WORKER REPORT - CALOUNDRA

2023 blended the cyclical nature of school life with the unpredictability unique to the Kairos experience. We introduced a diverse cohort of Year 10 students. Stabilising, adjusting, and adapting to the expectations and flow of our community. Our Year 11 students grew in confidence and maturity, building upon their experiences from the previous year and demonstrating a heightened academic focus. Our Year 12 students assumed leadership roles, at times reluctantly, whilst balancing their remaining academic commitments against charting their individual paths beyond Kairos. This dynamic environment provided constant opportunities to refine and implement a creative approach to the wellbeing and the Youth Work practice applied in the space.

Across all grades, our timetabled 'All Kinds Of' sessions adopted an intuitive approach to meeting the needs of our community, drawing guidance from individual interactions and emerging trends. We hosted guest speakers from a variety of organisations and collaborated again with IFYS to offer a customised program exploring the significance of safe and respectful romantic relationships. During challenging times, we crafted sessions centred on personal expression, fostering connections, and realigning around shared values. We included informative seminars on Complex Trauma, Mental Health, and Neuroscience, supplemented by lighter sessions incorporating various art and craft activities, mindfulness exercises, and social outings tailored to the group's preferences.





Through our daily engagement, we facilitated over 1,000 significant interactions and interventions over the course of the year. Complementing our Personal Learning Plan meetings, these conversations serve as crucial platforms for developing a clear comprehension of the hurdles our youth face, enabling us to strategise and devise solutions collaboratively. These interactions encompass a spectrum of support, ranging from crisis intervention and emotional regulation to providing information, education, case management, assessment for referrals, and often a combination of these approaches.

Continuing the cultivation of meaningful relationships with external partners remained a key focus for Amanda and I, acknowledging the constraints of our role and the limited time we have available against the often-extensive needs of our young people. Our students often require extensive guidance, and time, to understand the intricacies of external services, hold appropriate expectations, and develop the personal readiness required to engage with support successfully. Throughout the year, we facilitated numerous referrals spanning housing, mental and physical health, mentoring, driver's education and support, substance abuse counselling, relationship mediation, outreach youth work, NDIS assistance, and financial support.

As Amanda and I embark on our third year together as the Youth Work team here, we continue to be deeply invested and dedicated to making a difference. Even amid the fatigue that can accompany the nature of this work, there are moments of profound clarity that stem from the growth and positivity exhibited by the young individuals we support. Kairos is a space to foster potential, connection, healing, and progress. We are both profoundly grateful for the opportunity to apply our trade and contribute within this transformative environment.

YOUTH WORKER REPORT - DECEPTION BAY

Change is something Kairos faces every year, as we farewell graduates onto their next adventure, and welcome new tribe members to the beginning of theirs. Students were further challenged with developing greater resilience when met with changes in the staffing cohort. Zoey-Brooke and I assisted the young people in riding the waves between the loss of those connections and the pursuit of fostering new relationships with the incoming staff. 2023 challenged us all to keep our heads above the swell, as we re-centered ourselves to building the foundations of safety, relationships and fun as we found our flow and settled into the ripples of the terms.

As a Youth Worker within a school, you must know your 'why' and ground yourself in that purpose throughout your interactions with young people. One of our focus points, when students access our support, is re-engagement back into classes while maintaining flexible options to honour what is going on for that young person at that given time. Our Youth Workers use their knowledge and expertise in these interactions, ensuring the young person feels heard and has access to strategies to assist their journey. This is evident with an outcome of 75% of students returning to class.



Across all year levels, relationships were the second highest barrier faced by students in 2023 with 309 contacts with Youth Workers being made across their days. Most of the young people join our tribe with a want to make friends and feel accepted for who they are, however, find it difficult to start and maintain those relationships. It is a skill that we as Youth Workers strive tirelessly to foster and develop within the safe confines of Kairos. This is done through encouraging them to address issues directly with the person, youth worker facilitated mediations and a redirection back to our principle of respect. To extend upon this, during the class 'All Kinds Of', our Year 12 students engaged in Love Bites, a Respectful Relationships Education Program delivered through Lutheran Services.

Zoey-Brooke and I provide a space for recognising that the young person's emotional and social development is foundational to their overall growth and success, the core of our Ripple Model. With another year of investing in wellbeing, and a commitment to nurturing the whole student, Kairos has ensured it remains a safe, supportive, and inclusive environment where young people can seize their opportune moment.

PATHWAYS REPORT

In the pursuit of guiding students towards fulfilling and purposeful post-schooling endeavours, Kairos Community College continues to provide support and opportunities for personal and professional development. Through structured work experience programs, external certificate courses, university partnerships, and strategic collaborations, we endeavour to equip students with the necessary skills and experiences to thrive in their chosen path.

Structured Work Experience Program

In the past year, 12 students actively engaged in a structured work experience program. This program offered students the invaluable opportunity to immerse themselves in various industries of interest, aiding them in making informed decisions about their future pathways. Through a one-week block of work experience, students not only gained practical insights but also cultivated essential skills such as proactivity, communication, and adaptability. Encouraging students to initiate contact with businesses further bolstered their confidence and broadened their horizons by exposing them to both unfamiliar experiences and environments.

External Certificate Courses and University Partnerships

Aligned with the subject offerings at Kairos Community College, students had the opportunity to pursue further qualifications through external certificate courses and university partnerships, contributing to Queensland Certificate of Education (QCE) points. In 2023, Kairos facilitated students in accessing certificate courses in diverse fields through TAFE, CQUniversity, iVet and other Registered Training Organisations in fields such as Aviation, Community Services, Hospitality, Animal Care, Justice Studies, Automotive Electrical Technology, Salon Assistant, Retail Cosmetics and Health Support Assistance. A further 9 students engaged in School-based Apprenticeships or Traineeships in a variety of different fields from Bricklaying through to Business or Sport and Recreation. Additionally, partnerships with institutions like the University of the Sunshine Coast (UniSC) enabled students to study university subjects through the HeadStart program, providing invaluable real-world experiences in tertiary education.

Other Initiatives

In addition to work experience programs and external qualifications, Kairos also focuses on utilising digital platforms to enhance students' career prospects and understanding of their strengths and interests. The Kairos Community College Pathways website serves as a valuable resource in the Career Education short course, providing students with an understanding of their personality and the career areas that they are best suited. The Alumni Facebook groups foster networking opportunities and ongoing support for students beyond graduation.

Kairos Community College has forged strong partnerships with entities such as Link and Launch, a service dedicated to supporting young individuals who have completed Year 12 but are not currently engaged in education, employment, or training. This collaboration aims to assist students in navigating their options and choosing pathways conducive to successful transitions to study, training, or employment post formal education.



PATHWAYS REPORT



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Outcomes

As we reflect on the accomplishments of the past year, Kairos Community College remains committed to empowering students, fostering personal growth, and facilitating transitions into fulfilling post-schooling endeavours.

The efforts invested in guiding students towards their desired pathways yielded promising outcomes. Among the 2023 graduates, 1 student secured direct entry into university, studying Bachelor of Biomedical Science, while 4 embarked on Tertiary Preparation Pathway course as a precursor to tertiary education. Furthermore, 4 students enrolled in full-time vocational education and training (VET) studies at TAFE Queensland to pursue their dreams, while 3 students embarked on apprenticeships. Notably, 15 students transitioned into the workforce, equipped with the skills and experiences garnered through Pathways initiatives.

A significant achievement worth noting, this year across both campuses we had young people undertake 83 nationally recognised Vocational Education and Training qualifications, alongside 7 students who completed School-based Apprenticeships or Traineeships. Additionally, from our combined 38 Year 12 graduates, a total of 49 nationally recognised Vocational education qualifications were attained, along with one student earning a Distinction for a University of the Sunshine Coast HeadStart course in Psychology.

Through a multifaceted approach encompassing work experience programs, external qualifications, digital initiatives, university partnerships, and strategic collaborations, Pathways continues to support students as they embark on their individual journeys towards success.


CHARACTERISTICS OF THE STUDENT BODY



Kairos has 7 part time staff with the remainder being full time.




STUDENT OUTCOMES

KCC responds to non-attendance in a number of ways:

- 1. Roll is marked each lesson.
- 2. If student is not present and the school has not been notified of their absence, an SMS is sent to parents/carers of absent young people.
- 3. Responses to SMS are recorded. Non-explained absences are then phoned.
- 4. We also have a bus service to pick up students in the Moreton Bay and Caloundra areas.

For students who may be having personal or health issues affecting their attendance, we also endeavour to connect with students through outreach to support them to engage in school work and re-engage back into attending school regularly.
